#### 12TH ANNUAL MAP NEIGHBORHOOD CONFERENCE RECAP

It was a fun-filled day full of information from our workshop speakers, free breakfast and lunch provided by our sponsors, and an information fair including City booths, local organizations and businesses, health screenings from our partners SET for LIFE, and a pickle ball demonstration!

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#### YOUTH LEADERSHIP ACADEMY


Completing the 7-week Youth Leadership

### Department & Division Highlights

#### **ADMINISTRATIVE SERVICES**

The Administrative Services Department is one of the City's six operating departments and we, along with all other departments throughout the City, are committed to serve the people of Monrovia to create a community that offers a premier quality of life. We are thankful for the opportunity to share some information about our department, so that you can get to know us better!

Administrative Services oversees, manages, and reports on all of the City's financial assets and financial transactions. Everything we do touches the City finances in one way or another. Our department is comprised of fifteen full-time employees and one part-time employee, and our annual operating budget is \$2.9 million. We are largely a support department, as we provide support to the City's internal operating departments, so they can have the tools that they need to be fiscally successful. #### **ADMINISTRATION**

Many people believe that the
Administrative Services Department
only handles the City's money. There's
actually a lot more to it! Administration
is one of the many functions in the
Administrative Services Department.
This area focuses on short-term and
long-term financial planning to ensure
the financial health and stability of the
City. Developing plans and policies to
help guide and manage the City's
financial resources is one of our key
responsibilities.



### Department & Division Highlights

#### **BUDGETING AND LONG-TERM FINANCIAL PLANNING**

Our department takes the lead in coordinating the development of the budget each year. We work closely with the City Manager's Office and all operating departments to develop a thoughtful and diligent budget that will be presented to City Council for consideration for approval. The budget is the City's Spending Plan, and it guides how the City allocates its resources. After the budget is approved by City Council, we work closely, throughout the year, with City departments by helping them track their budgets. Everyone knows things don't always go as planned, so we are also constantly tracking our budget to make sure that we stay within our Spending Plan. Quarterly budget updates are presented to City Council and adjustments are proposed, when needed.

#### GENERAL ACCOUNTING AND FINANCIAL REPORTING

We also maintain the City's books. We make sure that the City's financial transactions are recorded accurately in the City's accounting records. At the end of the year, we summarize this financial information in a report called the Annual Comprehensive Financial Report (ACFR). This report is available on the City' website. Please feel free to check it out! As part of this process, we also undergo an annual financial audit by an independent CPA firm, who reviews the City's accounting records and internal controls. We are happy to share that the City has received "clean" audits each year, and our financial report meets the highest reporting standards possible. For 27 years straight, the City has received the Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting. The Government Finance Officers Association (GFOA) issues this award after reviewing the City's ACFR and determining it to meet the program's standards and qualifications. This is the highest form of recognition in the area of governmental accounting and financial reporting.

#### TREASURY/CASH MANAGEMENT

With great power comes great responsibility. The City has many short-term and long-term expenses, and one of our many responsibilities is to ensure that there are adequate funds to support these needs. Making prudent investments is one way that we ensure the safety, liquidity, and return on the City's funds.

### Department & Division Highlights

#### **FINANCE OPERATIONS**

One of the biggest areas in Administrative Services is finance operations. The operational functions listed below help to ensure that the City's day-to-day financial transactions, bills, and receipts are processed.

#### **PAYROLL**

Did someone say payday?! Fun fact, the Payday candy bar was invented in 1932. This function is one that brings smiles to people's faces. Our team ensures that the City's bi-weekly payroll is processed and all federal and state reports are filed timely.

#### **ACCOUNTS PAYABLE**

We also process payments to our vendors, consultants, and contractors for good and services that they provide to the City. We make sure to adhere to purchasing policies, maintain vendor accounts, and pay the City's bills every week.

#### ACCOUNTS RECEIVABLE AND CASHIERING/CASH HANDLING

The City also sends bills to different entities and individuals, for various services that the City provides. That's handled through the accounts receivable function. This operation is responsible for billing, collecting payments, and handling cash.

#### UTILITY BILLING

Have you visited City Hall to pay your water bill? If you have, then you've probably met one of our friendly staff members! We enjoy meeting you and assisting you with your utility bill payments. In addition to issuing monthly utility bills to approximately 10,000 customers, we also work closely with our Public Works department to coordinate activities related to customer accounts.

These are the functions that make up the Administrative Services Department! In a nutshell, we manage the City's finances and provide support to all our other operating departments, to help ensure the City's fiscal health and sustainability, so that we can continue serving you!

## Community Activist Policing Tip

#### CYBER SAFETY TIPS FOR MONROVIA PARENTS

- Keep the computer in a common area, such as the family or living room. This helps you monitor your child's computer use.
- Spend time with your child online, and talk to them about their internet use. Ask to see their profile page(s). Many children have more than one profile. You can also Google your child's name and see what comes up.
- Know your child's screen names and passwords. Ask your child to add you as a "friend" on his/her profile page.
- Limit the information allowed in online profiles and make sure profiles are set to "private".
- Control access to chat rooms and Instant Messaging. Monitor the sites they are visiting by clicking the internet browser's History button.
- Teach children to avoid risky behavior, such as maintaining buddy lists that include strangers, flirting, or discussing sex online with people they do not know in person, posting sexually aggressive material, or being rude or mean to someone online.
- Teach children to immediately notify a parent, guardian, or teacher if they are bullied or made to feel uncomfortable online.
- Remind children that computer use is not confidential.
- Keep the lines of communication open.
- Make agreements about computer use, such as sites they are allowed to visit and the length of time they can be online.

#### HERE ARE BASIC SAFETY RULES YOU SHOULD INCLUDE IN YOUR AGREEMENT:

- Never give out personal information (name, age, address. phone) or use a credit card online without permission
- Never share passwords with anyone, including friends
- Never arrange to meet in person someone they met online unless you agree and go with them
- Never reply to a bully or any other uncomfortable message they receive online
- Agree upon the consequences for not following the rules or breaking the agreement. It can be helpful to write down the rules and agreements in the form of a contract.

## Code Enforcement Tip

THE GOAL OF THE CODE ENFORCEMENT PROGRAM IS TO WORK WITH RESIDENTS, BUSINESSES, AND PROPERTY OWNERS TO ACHIEVE COMPLIANCE AND ENHANCE OUR COMMUNITY!

#### **GREEN POOLS & MOSQUITOS**

Summer is fast approaching yet mosquitos have already started making their nuisance behavior known. Spring showers and warm weather welcomes the aedes mosquito or better known as 'ankle biters' as well as the common southern house mosquito. How can Monrovia residents and business owners help eliminate these little nuisances? Source Reduction! According to the San Gabriel Valley Mosquito & Vector Control District, 'source reduction' is much more effective at eliminating mosquitos than the use of chemicals and pesticides.

#### **HELPFUL 'SOURCE REDUCTION' TIPS**

- Remove any stagnant water. Mosquitos can use
  the smallest amount of stagnant water (for
  example, a filled water <u>bottle cap</u>) to lay their
  eggs and grow. Stagnant water can be found in
  places like water fountains, plant saucers, yard
  cuttings, pile of recycles, unused tires, etc.
  Basically anyplace were water can collect and
  become stagnant.
- SGV Vector Control recommends 'Tip 'n Toss'! Tip any stagnant water and toss out unused containers. Walking your property and tip 'n tossing once a week will help dramatically reduce mosquito infestation.



- Green pools are not only a safety hazard but also a mosquito haven! Even the smallest amount
  of stagnant water in a drained pool can create an environment conducive to mosquito breeding.
  Make sure pools are routinely cleaned and treated or drained of all water leaving no stagnant
  water behind.
- Educate your neighbors. Take responsibility of your own yard but also talk to your neighbors to do the same. Together we can help Monrovia be a safer and healthier community.

#### **YELLOW TAGS**

In an effort to reduce illegal dumping and encourage proper disposal of bulky items, the City of Monrovia launched the #CleanMonrovia campaign. This is a multi-department strategy to provide educational resources to residents and to curb illegal dumping.

Code Enforcement Officers will be placing a yellow tag on dumped items and at the front door of the property if they are unable to make contact with the resident. These "yellow tags" have a step-by-step process to schedule a bulky item pickup with Athens Services so it does not become illegal dumping.

If you receive a yellow tag and did NOT schedule with Athens, please remove the item from public view and schedule a pickup with Athens. It will typically be the same day as your trash service. If you DID schedule a pickup you can disregard the yellow tag.


#### LIBRARY PARK FOUNTAIN

The Library Park Fountain at the entrance to the library along Myrtle Avenue is a wonderful feature that was built in 2009. It coincided with completion of the new bond-funded Monrovia Public Library building that same year. This 30-foot diameter Art Deco-inspired fountain features a decorative central spout pedestal and custom glass tiles in green and black. The fountain not only adds to the beauty of the park, but also contributes to the sustainable design of the park integral to the plans created by the City. It uses re-circulated water, reduces the heat island effect which in turn reduces ambient temperatures surrounding the water feature, and masks



urban environmental noise. It provides a peaceful backdrop to picnics in the park or a walk along Myrtle Avenue.

The fountain is an integral part of Library Park's overall relaxing, inviting tone and provides visitors with a beautiful feature when going to the library or the many community events hosted each year in the park.



### Hidden Gems in Monrovia

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#### MARK TWAIN STATUE IN LIBRARY PARK

Funded by the city's Art in Public Places program, the bronze statue was placed in Library Park near the corner of Myrtle Avenue and Lime Avenue with a special dedication on March 29, 2003. Its artist, award-winning sculptor Gary Price, has captured the famous author sitting on a bench, reading one of his books. It provides the perfect spot to sit and listen to the nearby fountain or enjoy the sunshine while in Library Park.

The Mark Twain Statue is just one of the many pieces of public art that can be found throughout the city as well as public art in Library Park. There is also a mural made of over 3000 discarded books called "Sunday Drive" by Mike Stilkey inside the library as well as Samson the Bear in the Youth Services Area. Monrovia is full of beautiful, amazing public art to discover!
