THE STEPS



LOG YOUR HOURS

Track it Forward is the program we use to track volunteer efforts. Volunteers can log hours via the web or mobile app, as well as sign up for events and track their progress for requirements.

Step 1: Go to

www.monroviaareapartnership.com/leg= hours and scroll down until you see the Track It Forward widget.

Step 2: Create an account by clicking on 'Click Here to Register'. Fill out the information.

Step 3: Log your hours by filling in the number of hours volunteered, date volunteered, activity, and bonus points (if any), and click 'Submit Time'.

GOALS

- Increase participation of MAP Leaders at events, social media, and in their neighborhoods.
- Provide toolkits to encourage networking amongst neighbors in the different zones.
- Honor those MAP Leaders who climb the tiers and dedicate their time to the community.
- Encourage MAP Leaders to recruit their neighbors and get involved.

COMMUNITY SERVICE HOURS

- In addition to earning points to climb the tiers, MAP Leaders will earn hours for the time they spend volunteering at activities.
- MAP will then award the Leader with the United States Presidential Volunteer Service Award (National Award)
- Bronze (100 hrs), Silver (250 hrs), and Gold (500+ hours)
- Receive a pin, certificate, and letter from the President of the United States.

HONORING LEADERS

Once a year, MAP will make a presentation to City Council honoring all the MAP Leaders who moved up a tier or were awarded a Presidential Volunteer Service Award. MAP Leaders will receive pins for each tier and can proudly display them on their lanyards or clothing.

COMMUNITY SERVICES - LIBRARY DIVISION

The Monrovia Public Library enriches lives by fostering life-long learning. This is achieved by ensuring every member of the community has access to a range of ideas and information, in a variety of formats, to meet the educational, informational, and recreational needs of the community. Staff provides a variety of programs and services to meet the needs of the community and patrons of all ages. The library includes several areas of service: Circulation, Youth, Adult, Literacy, Veterans, and the Monrovia Reads Mobile Literacy Program. Most importantly, the library is a place for the community to meet, discover, and learn.



CIRCULATION SERVICES

Circulation Services is the first point of contact for the public. Staff greets customers as they enter the building, answers directional and informational questions, supports patrons and directs incoming calls. Staff creates new library accounts for patrons, checks materials in and out of the library, processes new library materials, and manages overdue fines and payments.

YOUTH SERVICES

Youth Services presents programs and activities to support educational, recreational, and developmental needs of children through literacy and STEAM programs. Types of programming include story times, Innovation Lab workshops, class visits, and outreach events. Staff provides reference and reader's advisory services to youth of all ages, parents, caregivers, and people who work with children. The library team develops a collection of resources in both print and non-print formats to support 21st century job skills, literacy development, educational and recreational needs. and local school curriculum.





ADULT SERVICES

Adult Services provides reference and reader's advisory services to adults using the collection in a variety of formats including digital, print, and non-print resources.

Educational and cultural programs and activities support life-long learning for adults of all ages, including music programs, outreach to senior facilities, and game nights. Preservation of local history resources supports the community's rich heritage.

LITERACY SERVICES

The Adult Literacy Program provides one-to-one or small group instruction by trained volunteer tutors. Resources include digital and print materials and instruction is based on each individual's goals and supports English speaking adults with basic reading and writing skills. As a result, adult learners can reach their potential as workers, parents, community members, and life-long learners.



Staff is responsible for managing the Adult Literacy Program, as well as recruiting, hiring, and training volunteer tutors. This is the only program dependent on donations and grants, and the staff is responsible for grant writing and reporting statistical information to the State Library in support of the California Library Literacy Services Grant. The Monrovia Public Library Foundation supports Literacy Services through annual contributions to provide materials, software, and technology for Adult Learners.

VETERANS SERVICES

The Veterans Resource Center provides assistance to local veterans and their families. An on-site Veterans Services Officer as well as a representative from local nonprofit, Veterans Peer Access Network, offer one-on-one appointments to discuss benefits and local service information for veterans and their family members.



MONROVIA READS MOBILE LITERACY PROGRAM

The new, literacy-focused version of the Monrovia Reads & Plays program, was relaunched as the Monrovia Reads Mobile Literacy Program (or Monrovia Reads Van) in March 2018. The Library oversees and staffs the van with funding from the City and the nonprofit Monrovia Reads as well as their corporate sponsors.



During the academic year, the van visits each of the schools in the district, from preschool to high school, providing: library books for check out, creating library cards for parents and families, as well as literacy rich activities. During the summer, the Monrovia Reads Van offers mobile library services for summer school programs and local community events.

YEAR IN REVIEW: 2022

- Community members borrowed 170,685 items from the library
- Staff answered 25,679 reference questions
- Patrons saved \$1,520,840 by using their library card to borrow items instead of purchasing them
- The Veterans Resource Center staff had 1,107 interactions with veterans and their family members, connecting them with benefits and services
- The Adult Literacy Program offered 67 programs for 616 Adult Learners
- Youth Services staff provided 152 programs for 7,936 children, families, caregivers, and teens
- The library catalog was searched 123,362 times
- Staff provided a total of 245 programs for 9,205 attendees of all ages
- The Monrovia Reads Van supported 8,785 students at local schools, who borrowed 4,698 books

- The online Legacy Project local history resource had 8,509 searches for photos, directories, articles, and oral histories documenting Monrovia's past
- Patrons borrowed 14,382 ebooks via the library's Overdrive Libby platform

YELLOW TAGS

In an effort to reduce illegal dumping and encourage proper disposal of bulky items, the City of Monrovia launched the #CleanMonrovia campaign. This is a multi-department strategy to provide educational resources to residents and to curb illegal dumping.

Code Enforcement Officers will be placing a yellow tag on dumped items and at the front door of the property if they are unable to make contact with the resident. These "yellow tags" have a step-by-step process to schedule a bulky item pickup with Athens Services so it does not become illegal dumping.

If you receive a yellow tag and did NOT schedule with Athens, please remove the item from public view and schedule a pickup with Athens. It will typically be the same day as your trash service. If you DID schedule a pickup you can disregard the yellow tag.

Code Enforcement Tip

BULKY ITEM PROGRAM

As spring ends, all signs point to summer, which is looming right around the corner. With the warmer weather comes the desire to get rid of the old to make way for the new. The question then arises, how do I get rid of bulky items?

As part of the City's partnership with Athens Services, residential customers get two (2) free bulky item trash pick-ups per calendar year.

To schedule a bulky item pick-up, contact Athens Services at (888) 336-6100 or complete the online form at Athens Services. Items should be placed next to your trash barrels the night before your normal trash collection day.

Have you seen the yellow tags on a bulky item? These are educational door hangers to help explain how to properly dispose of bulky items. They are translated into Spanish on the reverse side. If you receive one of these, do not worry, it is not a fine. Simply remove the item from public view and place out on trash day after calling Athens or going online to schedule the pick-up.

- Dryers & Washing Machines
- Furniture, Mattresses, & Rugs
- Refrigerators & Microwaves
- Oversized Toys

Not acceptable Items

- Automobile Parts or Vehicles
- Construction Debris
- Hazardous Waste
- Heavy Items (e.g. Pool Tables & Pianos)



Code Enforcement Highlight

COMMUNITY!

The Code Enforcement Division received a complaint regarding a recreational vehicle parked in the driveway for a long time, peeling paint on the home, trash and debris, and overgrown vegetation in the backyard.

Code Enforcement immediately got to work! The Officer opened a case and sent an education letter to the property owner. After not receiving a response, the Officer issued a warning notice. The Officer also went by the property to knock on the front door to speak with the person who lives there.

The owner eventually called the Officer and began making progress on the property. This started with cleaning up the debris, cutting the vegetation, and painting the house. The owner kept Code Enforcement updated along the way and reached full compliance! They were grateful for Code Enforcement working with them to achieve the end result. This is a great example of Monrovia Code Enforcement working with residents to abate violations and help make the community look great!



The CDBG Residential Rehabilitation Program provides grants to qualified low to moderate-income homeowners of single-family detached homes to make needed home improvements; code deficiencies, eliminate blight, new roof replacement/repairs, and more eiligible healthy and safety improvements.



OPENS: MONDAY, JULY 10 @ 10 AM CLOSES: MONDAY, JULY 24 @ 10 AM



- Eligible Areas Residents residing in a single-family dwelling located within the incorporated boundaries of the City of Monrovia. Residents living in unincorporated areas of Monrovia, please visit 211LA for additional resources.
- Eligible Income Annual household income does not exceed the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) established "Low-Moderate Income" limits shown on the next page. Gross family income includes all income from all family members living in the household.
- Step 1: Submit form via email during program opening timeframe
 - $\circ~$ Completed and signed $\underline{\text{Eligibility Intake Form}}$ submitted via email to amenasakanian@ci.monrovia.ca.us
 - o Due to the amount of forms received and extensive time needed to review each form, reviews will be conducted as they come in on a first come, first serve basis.
- Step 2: If notified by City staff to move forward, the following will be requested for submission and consideration:
 - o Fill and complete application packet
 - Copy of income tax forms for 2022
 - o Copy of income verification documentation this includes the three (3) months of the most recent consecutive...
 - Payroll stubs
 - Social Security (SSI) checks
 - Aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC) checks
 - Pension and retirement checks
 - Alimony and child support payments
 - OR other income documentation from all other income sources, for all members of the household
 - Copy of asset verification documentation
 - o Copy of photo identification for all members in the household

Hidden Gems in Monrovia

ANDERSON HOUSE

The George H. Anderson House museum, at 215 E. Lime Avenue, is a charming and historic home that offers a glimpse into the early days of Monrovia. This beautiful house was built in the late 1800s by John Anderson, a Los Angeles contractor who was impressed by the promise of the new town. The house was designed as a family home for his wife Lizzie, son Lewis, and the baby on the way, George, who would later occupy the home for almost 88 years!

George went on to work at the First National Bank of Monrovia for his entire career, retiring as an assistant manager in 1934. The home stayed in the Anderson family until George's death in 1974, when it was inherited by the California Community Foundation, which he



attempted to sell it. Fortunately, the Friends of the Monrovia Public Library stepped in and secured a grant to purchase and restore the house. The Monrovia Historical Society later took over responsibility for the house and oversaw its restoration.



Today, the Anderson House has undergone extensive repairs and is now furnished with authentic period pieces that show what it was like to live in the early days of Monrovia. It is a cherished piece of Monrovia's history, offering visitors a chance to step back in time and experience life in the early days of the town. The home is open for tours on the third Sunday of each month from 1 to 4 p.m. without an appointment.

And now, visitors can also tour the museum virtually, thanks to a 3D walkthrough created by Monrovia High School game design and engineering classes led by Dionisio Tafoya of Dionysus Creative, and coordinated by the San Gabriel Valley Economic Partnership & K12 Foothill Consortium.

On a laptop or desktop computer, move by clicking where you want to go or by using the arrow buttons. Look up or down, left or right, by dragging while holding down the left mouse button.

On a cell phone, move by tapping where you want to go. Look around by swiping left or right, up or down.

The building is also one of Monrovia's Historic Landmarks.

DENTAL HYGIENE PRACTICE. CHIA LIN, RDHAP



Hello, my name is Chia "Francis" Lin. I am a Registered Dental Hygienist in Alternative Practice (RDHAP) who owns her mobile dental hygiene business. I have been a clinical hygienist for the past 10 years working in private offices, non-profits and community outreach.

While I have been lucky enough to experience the joy of seeing younger patients grow into wonderful adults, I have also felt the inevitable sadness of witnessing the decline in mental and physical health in elderly clients. Eventually these clients would stop coming to the office and I would not hear from them until I receive a

phone call from their family about their passing.

During this time my own father started to decline until he became homebound and passed away. This spurred my desire to provide care for those who have trouble getting the care they need. I obtained my license to become a mobile dental hygienist through the state of California in 2022 because I love the idea of serving the dentally underserved.

My goal is to reach out to those who cannot go to a traditional dental office to get care and offer preventative dental services in the comfort of their own residence. My RDHAP license allows me to serve people with physical and mental disabilities, the physically frail, and school children.

My business is very special in that not many people are aware of the services provided by a mobile dental hygienist. I take pride in how I run my mobile dental hygiene practice. All patient records and communications are HIPAA compliant. I follow OSHA and infection control protocol and dental hygiene standards of care on all my clients.

DENTAL HYGIENE PRACTICE. CHIA LIN, RDHAP

The appointment happens before I travel to the client, usually a residential care home or their own residence. Patient registration is made easy with an online portal. I reach out to obtain a physician's clearance if applicable. The actual appointment includes a blood pressure check, oral cancer screening, dental cleaning, brushing, flossing, fluoride application and daily home care education. Numbing agent and desensitizers are available to make the appointment more comfortable. I am an out-of-network provider and do not take any insurance; however, I provide a super-bill to submit to your insurance company for any reimbursement.


Ultimately, I love what I do, especially the human aspect of it. I enjoy listening to people's stories and learning about their lives. I enjoy talking to them about oral health and its impact on overall health. Sometimes just giving them a touch on the hand or a hug is enough because a simple act of "I care" can mean so much.

With my passion for inspiring the next generation, I love the work that Food Ed is doing (www.explorefooded.org). 
